# Community Planning Workshop Projects – Winter/Spring 2024:

- **Oregon Heritage Decennial Vitality Study** What are the most pressing issues facing Oregon's heritage sector today, and what do heritage organizations anticipate they will encounter over the next decade? What resources can support heritage organizations? **(Statewide)**
- **Business Oregon Economic Equity Investment Program (EEIP) Evaluation** How effective is the new EEIP at achieving the program's aims for organizations that received funding and for their beneficiaries? What should the Oregon Legislature and Business Oregon consider for the future of the program?

• Lincoln County Evacuation Planning - This project will assess, evaluate, and develop emergency evacuation plans for priority areas in Lincoln County. It will also inform local stakeholders about important mitigation efforts in affected evacuation areas, including critical infrastructure impacts and emergency preparedness steps. \*Oregon Chapter of the American Planning Association Student Achievement in Planning Award-2024

• **Oregon Heritage Resilience Planning** - This project will partner with two All-star Heritage Communities (Salem and Bend) to create Disaster Resilience Plans for heritage and cultural resources. It is intended to highlight the non-traditional roles that heritage resources and heritage organizations can play within emergency management.

Students in CPW are evaluated by instructors and external faculty reviewers in oral presentation, and visual skills.

- Presentation: Non-verbal, verbal, Organization, Content, Visual Aids, Q&A response
  - Average team scores: 25% Exemplary; 75% Proficient
- Visual: Clarity of Thinking, Content, Visual Style, Visual Communication, Writing/Audience
  - Average team scores: 50% Exemplary, 50% Proficient

# 2023 Exit Survey

Students are asked to self -evaluate on PAB knowledge, skills, and values. We chose a few indicators that align closely to our recently adopted Student Learning Outcomes (and 2022 PAB Standards.)

  - Professional Ethics and Responsibility: the ethics of public decision-making, research, and client representation (including the provisions of the AICP Code of Ethics and Professional Conduct, and APA's Ethical Principles in Planning). 93%
  - reducing inequities through critical examination of past and current systems

  - Planning impact: environmental, economic, and social/political factors that contribute to sustainable communities, reducing impacts of climate change, and creating equitable and climate-adapted futures.
